<b>Background :</b>	This gene encodes the fatty acid binding protein found in liver. Fatty acid binding proteins are a family of small, highly conserved, cytoplasmic proteins that bind long-chain fatty acids and other hydrophobic ligands. This protein and FABP6 (the ileal fatty acid binding protein) are also able to bind bile acids. It is thought that FABPs roles include fatty acid uptake, transport, and metabolism. <b>Function :</b>	domain:Forms a beta-barrel structure that accommodates hydrophobic ligands in its interior.,function:Binds free fatty acids and their coenzyme A derivatives, bilirubin, and some other small molecules in the cytoplasm. May be involved in intracellular lipid transport.,similarity:Belongs to the calycin superfamily. Fatty-acid binding protein (FABP) family.,
